

Lowell, Fall Creek Ed Foundation Awards Mini-Grants

From first aid/CPR instruction equipment to robotics/coding kits and more, in November the Lowell, Fall Creek Education Foundation awarded just over \$6,300 in mini-grants to ten different teachers. Each year the Foundation encourages teachers to apply for these grants to enhance learning in their classrooms.

The mission of the Foundation includes the goal of providing supplementary support to the programs and services provided to students in all schools in the Lowell School District.

The success of the 2016 Hall of Fame launched the Mini-Grant for Teachers program. Over \$25,000 has been awarded since then from this event and other donations to benefit students in classrooms throughout the District. To my fellow Lowellians:

At the November 5, 2024 City Council meeting, I turned in my resignation. The reason for my departure is that the City of Dayton, Oregon has selected me to be their next City Manager. My last day with Lowell will be December 5, 2024.

On Christmas Eve of 2020, I arrived in Oregon. Two days earlier, I had started the nearly 1,200-mile drive from Colorado's Western Slope, where I was living at the time. When I arrived, Oregon was at the height of the COVID-19 restrictions. Social gatherings were limited to six people. Restaurants provided take-out only. The city staff and I kept our six feet of distancing, and we wore masks. City Hall was closed to the public. It's amazing how much has changed since then and how quickly the time has passed. When I joined Lowell as your City Administrator, the Crestview Estates subdivision was still vacant land. Now it, along with the Sunset Hills subdivision, have been completely built out. We built a new, modern City Hall and library, and we hired our first ever professional Library Director. We invested in our infrastructure, and we implemented a new development code to align with the "Downtown Master Plan" that was adopted prior to my arrival. The list goes on. Lowell is in a strong position, and the future is bright.

Our success is due to the hard-working team members who serve this community every day with diligence: our staff, volunteers, committee members, and City Council. In my 13 years' experience in local government, this is the best team I've ever had the privilege of serving.

Until the City Council finds a permanent replacement, Public Works Director Max Baker will be serving as Interim City Administrator. The city will be in good hands under his experienced, capable leadership. Max and I have been working together since my announcement to ensure a seamless transition.

Thank you for your trust and support. Serving the Lowell community has been a meaningful experience, and I'm proud of all we have accomplished together.

Important Information Regarding Lead and Copper Testing

The City conducts routine lead and copper testing of residents' drinking water in compliance with the EPA's "Lead and Copper Rule" (LCR). Every three years, we test water from 10 high-risk homes, identified based on plumbing age and materials, to monitor for lead and copper levels. In the city's latest testing, lead levels exceeded the EPA's "action level," meaning we must take steps to reduce potential lead exposure.

The City's surface water, sourced from Dexter Reservoir, does not contain detectable levels of lead. Instead, the primary source of lead exposure in drinking water comes from the plumbing within homes and businesses. Lead can leach into water from lead pipes, faucets, and fixtures, especially in older buildings.

The City is sending more information in November's utility bills, including steps you can take to reduce your exposure to lead in drinking water. You can also find more information online at the following link:
