Lowell Musicians Shine Among the Best in Oregon

Each year, the top high school musicians statewide are selected by audition for the Oregon Music Educators Association All-State Band and Choir. Lowell was fortunate to have five such young people chosen for this amazing honor: LiamBurch (junior/trombone), Emma Cobiskey (senior/alto voice), Alex Sotomayor (junior/bass voice), Eric Sotomayor (freshman/clarinet), and Nate Waters (freshman/tenor voice). Liam and Eric were two of only eighteen 2A/1A players selected out of 300 for all divisions. Meanwhile, our three singers were the only students again, out of 300 overall — selected from a public small school such as ours. For those able to participate in the program, they spent three days living and breathing music together in Eugene, rehearsing for up to 16 hours under some of the

best music directors in the country. This culminated in two remarkable concerts on January 19th, and memories that will last a lifetime.

Up next for Lowell Music is the District 10 Honor Band event, hosted by Douglas High School on February 5th. The four boys mentioned above will be joined by seniors Paul Clark and Lizzy Green-Jolley, and juniors Ciaran Burch, David Finch, and Josh Walker, as they collaborate with the best musicians in Douglas County for more high-level music making. Junior highers Lukas Burdick, Yareli Delgado, Alexis Owsley, Zuzana Murray, and Gemma Parris will also be attending as part of the Jr. Honor Band. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend the free culminating concert that evening at 7:00pm in the Douglas HS Gymnasium.

Fire Protection Funding Levy Proposed

It has been 22 years since Lowell Fire went out to the community for a request of funds to improve the fire station. Since that time Lowell Fire has not asked for more funding. Over the last few years, we have seen a change in revenues-to-expenses ratio. We know that you as a community member have also faced this. We have worked hard and and with diligence to reduce expenses. We have reduced costs in building maintenance and equipment maintenance, where we can. We have limited purchasing equipment. The last few years we have seen expenses increasing 3% to 12%, with revenue only increasing around 2% to 3%. We have been hopeful that things would level out, but they have not.

We are asking the community for an affirmative vote on a funding ballot measure. The measure to support your fire services would amount to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Example: a \$400,000 market value has a \$220,000 assessed value and would be an \$330 tax increase. You can find your values from your annual tax statement.

This proposed tax levy would be a five-year request. Over those years, it would bring in important funds for community safety: 2025/2026 – \$347,052; 2026/2027 – \$353,993; 2027/2028 – \$361,073: 2028/2029 – \$368,294; 2029/2030 – \$375,660 for a total of \$1,806,072 over the term of the levy. The costs for this measure are estimates. They are from the best information available from the county assessor. They may reflect early payment discounts, compression, and the collection rate.

These funds maintain our current levels of fire protection and emergency medical services. They support a maintenance program for property and equipment. We invite you to come to the station with any questions around the current budget and what we are facing. Informational meetings are forthcoming soon. We provide you the necessary information to make an informed decision.


