

For the second time in three years, the Lowell High School Band has outperformed all others to claim the 2A/1A State Championship! After sailing through qualifiers, the Red Devils found some tough competition at State Finals (May 10th at OSU), but performed an impressive set of college-level repertoire and ultimately sealed their victory by dominating in the tricky 'sight-reading' portion of the event. "I couldn't be prouder of these kids," says Music Director Paul Burch. "They fought back to overcome some mistakes and finish strong. That resolve, their belief in themselves, and their commitment to this program is truly inspiring."

On April 29th, the Lowell High School Concert Choir managed an incredible 2nd-place finish in the 2A/1A State Finals, held at Oregon State University. In a division long dominated by private schools, this was the highest finish by any public school in State history! The Red Devils impressed with an advanced set of all a capella selections on stage, tying for 1st with one judge, and managed a top-three ranking in the daunting 'sight-reading' portion to secure the record-breaking finish. "I can't overstate how huge this is," says Music Director Paul Burch. "The private schools absolutely dominate in Choir. Our kids pulled off an incredible and historic feat here, a true triumph by the underdogs. What an incredible gift it's been to work with this special group — I'll never forget them!"

More Records and Impressive Feats for Lowell Music

By finishing 1st and 2nd, respectively, in OSAA Band and Choir State Finals, Lowell Music has achieved in 2019 the highest dual finish for any 2A/1A public school in State history. Indeed, this rare '1-2' punch hasn't been achieved by any other school (public or private) in the modern OSAA era. Truly rarefied air for our young musicians!

In yet a *third* category, the Lowell Brass Sextet (Owen Chapman, Ian Sotomayor, Nicky Sotomayor, Jason Stratis, Timmy Stratis, and Taysian Williamson) competed in the OMEA Chamber Ensemble State Finals on April 26th. In direct competition with some schools *twenty* times our size, the Red Devils managed the highest finish for any 'large' brass ensemble for 2A/1A, 3A, 4A, or 5A!



Additionally, BCA student and Lowell Band member David Bartzen competed at the OSAA Solo Music Championships (April 27th at Pacific University), finishing as the top 2A/1A trombonist in Oregon!

Code Enforcement Reminder and Abatement Procedures

The primary goal of code enforcement is to maintain the highest quality of life possible for residents by ensuring healthy and safe neighborhoods. That happens through enforcement of the Lowell Municipal Code, and specifically addressing issues that have been identified as a public health hazard, safety hazard or nuisance. The most common violations in Lowell include the following:

- ◆ Accumulations of garbage, junk and debris clearly visible from a street or alley
- ◆ Vegetation that needs to be cut back so that it doesn't impact sidewalks or streets
- ◆ Grass and weeds greater than 12 inches in height
- ◆ Dismantled vehicle parts stored on private property clearly visible from the street
- ◆ Unregistered or inoperable vehicles parked within the public right-of-way



These code violations are identified through quarterly neighborhood sweeps conducted by staff or by the submission of a formal complaint (forms are available online at www.ci.lowell.or.us or at City Hall). In either case, the following steps are completed to ensure compliance:

1. A door hanger is placed as a courtesy reminder for the specific code violation. The reminder provides 10 days to correct the violation.
2. A follow-up inspection is conducted. The owner and tenant (if applicable) of the property is issued a warning letter if the violation has not been corrected and provided 10 days to abate or protest the violation.
3. A second follow-up inspection is conducted. If the violation remains, the owner and tenant of the property may be issued a citation and/or notice of abatement. The cost of administration and abatement is assessed to the owner and/or the tenant.

Please note that cases involving vegetation or other violations which may pose an immediate health, fire, or traffic hazard follows a separate process due to the public safety risks involved. Such violations may be abated without prior notice to protect public health and safety.

The vast majority of code enforcement violations are resolved through public education and awareness. Fines and abatement are only intended to be used as a last resort to ensure compliance. Property owners or tenants that may be unable to correct the violations due to physical disability should contact City Hall to discuss special arrangements. If you have any questions regarding code enforcement, please feel free to contact City Hall during regular business hours at 541-937-2157.

Business Focus Groups

On Monday, May 14, the City of Lowell and Rural Development Initiatives (RDI) hosted a meeting to discuss the development of a local business network (i.e., Chamber of Commerce or Economic Development organization). Sixteen (16) stakeholders attended and expressed interest in a regional business organization to serve Lowell, Fall Creek, Dexter and Pleasant Hill. Marketing, technical assistance, and networking were identified as top priorities.



The stakeholders agreed that an additional meeting was needed to discuss next steps and setup a local Business Networking Steering Committee. Staff and RDI will host the meeting on June 10th from 5:00-6:00 PM at The Studios at the Pisgah Public Market, located at 35851 Hwy 58, Pleasant Hill, Oregon 97455. All business owners, non-profit organizations, and other stakeholders are invited to participate!
