## Winters Grabs the Ford Foundation Scholarship by Jeanie May, GEAR UP coordinator

When Melina Winters received the congratulations letter from The Ford Foundation Scholarship telling her that she was a scholarship recipient, her response was one of shock. She became one of 125 Oregon high school seniors and college students to join this elite group. After other scholarships and money devoted to her college education is factored in, the Ford Foundation Scholarship will pay “90% of the recipient’s unmet financial need with a limit of \$40,000 per year.”

Melina plans to be an RN, focusing on pediatric nursing. She has been accepted to Oregon Institute of Technology (OIT) and she has also received the OIT Presidential Scholarship, the Kaiser Scholarship, and the Lowell District School Publicist Scholarship. Cassie Day, teacher and counselor, said that Melina takes the initiative to get things done, a quality that many teachers admire. Melina admits that she is an “outgoing individual” which plays into her strengths. Day also said, “Melina faces obstacles and plows right through them.” Her strong voice shows up in her character and her writing, “A defining moment in my life was when I had to decide if I was strong enough to stand up for my heritage. Growing up in a small town in Oregon, being a person of color definitely puts you as a minority. I haven’t had a lot of African American representation in my life, but in this moment I felt I had to make a difference,” she wrote after a racial slur was uttered loud enough for her to hear but quiet enough for the teacher not to hear.



GEAR UP and Aspire have been important to Melina. She said that her college visits narrowed down her college prospects and that GEAR UP created a college-going climate which made her less scared to move away. Karen Cardwell, Aspire coordinator, and her team also received high marks from Melina as did her science teacher Toni Beckett, and her counselor Day. All these individuals helped her in various ways: from FAFSA and meeting deadlines, to science work and editing her essays. Once she receives her nursing degree from OIT, Melina plans to return to the Lowell area and contribute to the Lowell community.

## Mountain View Academy Plans Graduation Ceremony — Saturday, June 13th

On Saturday, June 13th, Mountain View Academy will be celebrating their 8th grade graduates and Kindergarten promotion. The students will walk in their caps and gowns and the families will watch from their cars. Eighth graders will each be partnered with a Kinder student to provide appropriate physical distancing.

### **Notice of Budget Committee Meeting and State Revenue Sharing Public Hearing**

A public meeting of the Budget Committee of the City of Lowell, Lane County, State of Oregon, to discuss the budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, will be held at 70 North Pioneer Street, Lowell, OR 97452. The meeting will take place on June 2, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to receive the budget message and to receive comment from the public on the budget. This is a public meeting where deliberation of the Budget Committee will take place. Any person may appear at the meeting and discuss the proposed programs with the Budget Committee. A copy of the budget document may be inspected or obtained on or after May 26 by calling Lowell City Hall at 541-937-2157 or on the City's website at [www.ci.lowell.or.us](http://www.ci.lowell.or.us).

At this meeting, the Budget Committee will also conduct a public hearing regarding the use of State Revenue Sharing Funds. Citizens are invited to recommend uses for State Revenue Sharing Funds distributed by the State of Oregon to the City of Lowell for fiscal year July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021.

### **Local State of Emergency Extended as City Prepares to Reopen Facilities**

The Lowell City Council formally declared a local state of emergency for the City of Lowell on March 17. On Tuesday, April 21 the City Council extended the local state of emergency through May 19. The emergency was extended again on May 19 and is in effect through June 16.

Staff is working on several changes to operations prior to reopening. This includes installing a physical barrier at the City Hall front counter, providing hand sanitizer at all facilities, and additional cleaning procedures for the public restrooms at Paul Fisher Park and Rolling Rock Park.

As a reminder, all City parks remain open for leisure and recreation. The playground at Paul Fisher Park, however, remains closed in accordance with the governor's executive order.
